Collect

First Reading

Jonah 3:1-5, 10 (RSV)

The word of the LORD came to Jonah the second time, saying, ²“Arise, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you.” ³So Jonah arose and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly great city, three days’ journey in breadth. ⁴Jonah began to go into the city, going a day’s journey. And he cried, “Yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!” ⁵And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and put on sackcloth, from the greatest of them to the least of them....¹⁰When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil way, God repented of the evil which he had said he would do to them; and he did not do it.

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 7:29-31 (RSV)

Brethren, the appointed time has grown very short; from now on, let those who have wives live as though they had none, ³⁰and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no goods, ³¹and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the form of this world is passing away.

Gospel

Mark 1:14-20 (RSV)

¹⁴Now after John was arrested, Jesus came into Gali-

lee, preaching the gospel of God, ¹⁵and saying, “The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent, and believe in the gospel.” ¹⁶And passing along by the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and Andrew the brother of Simon casting a net in the sea; for they were fishermen. ¹⁷And Jesus said to them, “Follow me and I will make you become fishers of men.” ¹⁸And immediately they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹And going on a little farther, he saw James the son of Zebedee and John his brother, who were in their boat mending the nets. ²⁰And immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired servants, and followed him.

A very warm welcome to Mass today, especially if you are new or visiting. This sheet contains information about the week's Masses, along with this week's readings and hymns. You are warmly invited to stay for coffee, tea and wine, which is served after the 10.30am Solemn Mass in the Bishop Challoner Hall downstairs.



Where does Jesus begin his ministry? Where John the Baptist left off - preaching a message of repentance, of change, to welcome the new Kingdom of God. There is a simplicity about this message, which is not compromised by anything - today's Gospel has these simple words from Jesus, and then the story of his calling more disciples to follow him and share in the work of spreading this message. Repentance has had something of a bad press - we tend to think of it as an old-fashioned concept. But every age needs to hear this call: to look at what we do and say and assume, and realise that there are such things as right and wrong, and that sometimes we follow the wrong path. To follow Jesus, and to accept the Kingdom of God, demands that we make a radical choice, which might well change our lives.

This Sunday's Readings

First reading

Jonah 3:1-5,10

Jonah calls the people of Nineveh to repentance, a call which they heed. In consequence, the disaster which would otherwise have befallen that great city is averted. Our actions have consequences, and sometimes they can be ruinous for us. This story reminds us, however, that God cares for us, and is always waiting for us to come to our senses and return to him.

Second reading

1 Corinthians 7:29-31

Paul reminds us that the world as we know it is passing away. We do not know when or how. In the meantime we live our lives with a certain detachment from earthly concerns. Yes, they matter, the day to day things that occupy us. But the Gospel matters *more*.

Gospel

Mark 1:14-20

John has been arrested, and Jesus continues his work by calling people to repentance. But he also announces the Good News. His call to us is first and foremost a call to *believe*. When he calls his first disciples, the call is so compelling that they drop everything, literally, to respond. Mark's Gospel account reminds us that nothing is to be preferred to the Gospel: the Good News is a call to conversion of life, but also an invitation to eternal life which Christ gains for us by his death on the Cross.

Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.
